At last, the book is complete, a handsome volume in a burgundy hard cover with gold foil title.

On Sunday, March 21st, at 9:15 a.m. in the Fireside Room, Gil will share some of the adventures he encountered along the way as he worked on this monumental project. Gil will then be available for a "book signing." Special refreshments will be available both after the 8:00 a.m. and the 10:30 a.m. worship services during the book signing. We are especially thankful to Gil and May for the many hours they expended to bring this project to completion. The volume will make a valuable keepsake for members, former members, children and grandchildren. The Chancel Cross Links Christmas to Good Friday



This chancel cross has been in the sanctuary since Ash Wednesday. Hewn from the Christmas tree that adorned our chancel during Christmas, it testifies to the intimate, intentional connection between the birth of our Savior in Bethlehem and His death on a cross in Jerusalem. During Holy Week, its appearance will change. Shrouded with black on Good Friday as we commemorate God's ultimate Sacrifice for us, the cross will be adorned with white flowers on Easter as we celebrate our Savior's Resurrection victory over sin, death and the grave.

You May Still Receive A Lenten Nail



If you wish to have a nail to carry in a purse or pocket as a daily reminder of the Savior's sacrificial love, or an extra nail for a friend or family member, you may secure one at church. When

March Is *Food Month*

Each March, Food Share runs the biggest food drive in the state. Neighbors, Inc. needs to restock the shelves to get through the summer months when children are home from school and not participating in school lunch programs.

A percentage of the money and food collected in March is matched and returned to the food shelf. The amount the food shelf receives is based on the amount the food shelf collects on its own. The more a food shelf collects each March, the more it receives in “incentive allocations.” All dollars received in March are earmarked for food only purchases by the food shelf. Your help is needed.

March Fireside Room Bible Class Examines “What Happens After Death?”



In February, the Fireside Room Bible Class examined the resurrection of Lazarus and the vehement hostility it stirred up among the religious leaders against Jesus. What was

Lazarus experiencing while he was dead? If he was already experiencing the joys of heaven, did he resent being brought back to a fallen world? John's Gospel didn't address questions about Lazarus. It focused our faith on the power Jesus has over death. His ability to raise Lazarus is a preview of what He would do Himself on Easter. It was also proof of the resurrection He will give to each of us on Judgment Day. That's why Christian funerals are solemn celebrations of the power of God to give us life after death by His grace.

In March, we will address some of the common questions that are raised concerning death, life after death, resurrection and heaven. We will notice what the Bible does and does not say about life after death and heaven. We will identify commonly held myths and clichés about what happens to people after they die and evaluate them according to what the Bible does say. Do babies become angels when they die? Can dead relatives watch what we are doing here on earth? Do the dead communicate with the living? When we die, are we aware of what is happening here on earth? Are we sleeping and not aware of anything?

You can add your own questions and we will discuss them and explore what answers we can find in the Bible. Because of the special program on March 21st to hear Gil Ude discuss his Saint James history project, we will meet on March 7, 14 and 28th to discuss these fascinating and intriguing questions. The Chapel Bible Class: Jesus Through Middle Eastern Eyes

After discussing Jesus' encounter with the Syro-Phoenician woman, we began our consideration of Jesus' encounter with the woman at the well of Samaria. How are these two women similar to each other? Why does Jesus treat them so differently? What does Jesus want us to learn about worship and evangelism? Dr. Kenneth Bailey points out aspects of Middle Eastern culture that would have been taken for granted by Jesus' disciples. Our problem is what he calls "cultural foreignness," but with the aid of his "Oriental exegesis," these familiar stories come to life in new and unexpected ways.

As usual, your questions and comments are encouraged. The class meets downstairs in the chapel between services on Sunday morning. The class is repeated on Tuesday mornings at 10:00 in the Fireside Room. Audio CD's are available in the Fireside kitchen. You can listen to the class on our Saint James web site. Saturday Morning Women's Bible Study Looks at a Portrait of Peter in Acts

Our midwinter break is over and we are ready to get back to our regular meetings on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month. This month, Lord willing, we will meet on March 13th and March 27th.

In the second half of the book of Acts we want to notice how Paul says and does many things that remind us of what Peter said and did in the first half of the book of Acts. Both apostles preach the same Gospel and they do similar miracles. Why did Luke tell the story in this way?

We pick up the story in chapter 16. Paul and Silas are just beginning their missionary journey by visiting the churches that Paul and Barnabas had founded on their first missionary journey. Do you suppose some of the people in Derbe and Lystra wondered where Barnabas was? Paul wanted to take young Timothy along, evidently in order to train him to become a pastor. If we take it for granted that Paul had written his letter to the Galatians before he and Silas began their missionary journey, how do we explain the fact that Paul circumcised Timothy? In the second chapter of Galatians, Paul says that Titus was not compelled to be circumcised. Paul insists that it is not necessary to be circumcised in order to be saved. But then when he comes back to Galatia, Paul goes ahead and circumcises Timothy. Why? What can we learn from Paul about how to handle doctrinal controversies in the church today?

Study: Reacting to Acts

The men meet on the first and third Saturdays of each month. This month we resume our study of the book of Acts. The second half of chapter 11 describes the church in Antioch, where Gentiles and Jews worshipped together in harmony. St. Luke wants to introduce us to this congregation because they are the people who will send Paul and Barnabas off on their first missionary journey. But before telling that story, chapter 12 will report on the death of James, the son of Zebedee, and Peter's miraculous escape from prison in Jerusalem. This chapter helps us to understand how the leadership of the church in Jerusalem passed to James the brother of Our Lord. How did the church in Jerusalem differ from the church in Antioch? How were they able to maintain good relations with each other despite their differences? What can we learn from their experience to help us in our church today? Your comments and questions are encouraged.

Greetings: For the month of March, all lessons will be focusing on our Savior. The biblical events that will be taught are:

Sunday, March 7th Jesus Feeds the 5000 John 6: 1-14
Sunday, March 14th: Jesus Seeks the Lost Luke 15

As a review of these lessons, please consider asking your child(ren) questions about that day's lesson – great times to do this are during meals, while driving, or before bedtime. Some questions to consider:

(3/7) Who provided the initial food?

(3/14) Who are "The Lost?"

(3/21) How was this done?

(3/28) Besides the apostles, who else was there?

Thank you for taking the time to ask questions about these lessons with your child(ren) – by reviewing these historical events, it better enables them to remember what was taught, and also broadens their understanding of our Savior's love for us.

Sunday School children received their Mite Boxes on Sunday, February 14th. The purpose of the Mite Box is to help your child learn to give to those who are less fortunate. This year's recipient of our Mite Box collection is the Second Harvest Heartland food bank. This organization can obtain and distribute nine dollars worth of food for every dollar collected! Sunday March 21- Pastor Albrecht and Terese Thune Report on Their Trip to Russia

Every Sunday we pray for Alex and Nadia Krongolm, who oversee the youth ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ingria in Russia (ELCIR). On Sunday January 31 they celebrated the 40th anniversary of the congregation in Petrozavodsk. Pastor Albrecht and Terese represented Saint James at the service.

After the second service on Sunday March 21, lunch will be provided and we will show pictures and tell stories from our trip. Here is a preview: Here is a picture of us with Alex and Nadia and their Skoda, a car made in The Czech Republic. It served us well.



Together with Paul Anderson from First Lutheran Church in Duluth, we flew to St. Petersburg, Russia via New York and Helsinki, Finland. During the communist years, St. Petersburg was called Leningrad. It is a beautiful city of about five million people. Our first stop was the headquarters of the ELCIR located at the St. Mary's Church in downtown St. Petersburg. After a Russian lunch of soup and salad, we were ushered in to meet with Bishop Arri Kugappi. We discussed present and future cooperation between our American churches and the ELCIR – especially the church in Petrozavodsk.

In spite of the cold, we walked around the city, seeing The Hermitage, a Russian equivalent of the Louvre. We also saw the Cathedral of St. Isaac, a huge and ornate Russian Orthodox church.

Our first two nights in Russia we slept in this dormitory at the Theological Institute in Koltushe, where we met many of the seminary students and the Rector, Fyodor Tulinin, a bright young theologian who speaks English well. The seminary trains pastors, as well as church musicians and Sunday school teachers. We discussed the possibility of hosting a symposium for the Ingrian Church like the one hosted by the Bible Faith Lutheran Church in India.

Pastor Timothy White and Mr. Donald Olsen from Columbus, Nebraska joined us on the second day, having been delayed by a snowstorm. We saw three different churches on our way to Petrozavodsk. We took pictures of each congregation and learned its history.



Petrozavodsk is the capital of Karelia, a region on the western edge of Russia that borders Finland. Over the centuries the Russo-Finnish border has moved back and forth, so many Finnish-speaking Lutherans today find themselves living in Russia. They continue to worship in Finnish, but new members speak Russian. They are switching to Russian in worship as our forefathers switched from German to English in America.

The 40th Anniversary Service was conducted by Pastor Victor Grenivitch, who led the liturgy in Finnish, and Pastor Alex Krongolm o led the liturgy in Russian. First, a hymn was sung in Finnish and then repeated in Russian. The hymn melodies were all familiar. There were three choirs who participated in the service. One was from the Ingrian Society, another was from the church in Koltushe, and the third was the youth choir from Petrozavodsk. The sermon was delivered by Bishop Kugappi in Russian. Nadia and her friend Vika provided a whispered running translation into English for us Americans.



After lunch dignitaries from Petrozavodsk presented Pastor Grenivitch with a large bouquet of flowers and extended their congratulations to the congregation. Such a friendly gesture would probably not have been possible twenty years ago.



After the program concluded, we joined Vika and her youth Bible class for a discussion of the story of Jonah. We Americans put on a little skit to introduce the story. The young people were attentive and engaged actively in the discussion. It was clear that Vika has built good relationships with them, and they respond to her teaching.



One of the main goals we had for this trip was to prepare the way for some of our young people from Saint James to come to Russia on a mission trip in the summer of 2011. We were able to observe the work that Alex and Nadia are doing among the young people in Russia, and we discussed with them what our youth might do during their visit to Russia. They youth of the congregation in Petrozavodsk are anxious to have our youth come, and it promises to be a memorable experience for everyone.

This trip was made possible by two special gifts from members of our congregation, so there was no expense charged to our congregational budget or the Missions budget.

To hear more stories and see more pictures, please come after the 10:30 a.m. worship service, March 21st. Lunch will be served and child care will be provided.

Saint James Finances

In January, \$43,012 was contributed for operating expenses. An additional \$1581 was contributed for "Operating Deficit Reduction." Expenses were \$65,580. **Our contributions were \$20,987 less than expenses in January.**

We brought a \$22,606 surplus into 2010 in the Operating Debt Reduction Fund which can be used for operating expenses. That surplus was used, and at the end of January, we had a cushion in our "Operating Deficit Reduction Fund" of **\$1,619.**

We are thankful to God for all the faithful members of Saint James who cheerfully and generously give their gifts, large and small, as they are able, to support the Lord's work among us. "The Lord loves a cheerful giver" says II Corinthians 9:7, so as we cheerfully give what we are able from faith, whether money, time or talents, God will use it to be a blessing as we offer our gifts from faith in Christ.

Dead Sea Scroll Presentations Scheduled for Tuesdays in April and May

Pastor Stadler has studied the Dead Sea Scrolls with Dr. Michael Wise and Dr. Martin Abegg, two Dead Sea Scroll translators. In 1999, he explored



three of the caves where scrolls were found and has continued to follow developments regarding the scrolls. He will make four presentations on Tuesday evenings in

April and May to help people understand the importance of the Dead Sea Scrolls.

The Scrolls will be on display at the Science Museum of Minnesota from March through August and Saint James has reserved 50 tickets to see the exhibit on May 16th. In preparation for attending that exhibit and for anyone interested in understanding more about the Dead Sea Scrolls, Pastor Stadler will offer the following four presentations: 1. How were they discovered, prepared for publication, translated and made available for scholars? 2. What is their contents and how old are they? How do scholars date them? 3. Who were the people who gathered them? Are they the people of Qumran where they were found? What can we know about them and the community at Qumran? 4. Which scrolls will be at the Science Museum on exhibit and why are they important to Christians? What big questions are not answered regarding the scrolls and how do non scholars follow the debate?
